Who's Really Blind?

Luke 18.3-43

As Jesus makes His way toward Jerusalem, He reveals what lies ahead—but His disciples still cannot see what He is trying to show them. In today's passage, we discover that sometimes the greatest blindness isn't in our eyes, but in our inability to see who Jesus is, what He can do, and the life He offers us.

The disciples did not understand any of this. Its meaning was hidden from them, and they did not know what he was talking about. Luke 18.34

Three questions that Luke wants us to think about:

1. What am I **NOT SEEING**?

Do you still not see or understand? Are your hearts hardened? Do you have eyes but fail to see, and ears but fail to hear? Mark 8.17-18

2. How badly do I **WANT TO SEE**?

I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry. Psalm 40.1

3. What do I want Jesus **TO DO FOR ME**?

Now all glory to God, who is able, through his mighty power at work within us, to accomplish infinitely more than we might ask or think. Ephesians 3.20 NLT

We might say there are two kinds of people in the world: those who know they're blind and those who are blind to their blindness.

If you know you're blind, like the blind man—**KEEP CRYING OUT TO JESUS.**

Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus, praising God. Luke 18.42-43

If you don't know you're blind, like the disciples—**KEEP FOLLOWING JESUS** until He opens your eyes.

I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. Ephesians 1.18-19

What is God saying to me?

What am I going to do about it?
